READING ENABLES ADULT DEVELOPMENT

R.E.A.D. is a volunteer based adult literacy program that provides one-on-one tutoring for individuals with minimal literacy proficiency. Our service helps adults improve their basic life skills such as filling out forms correctly and reading medical prescriptions accurately. Our tutors help their students achieve personal goals such as reading to their children and attaining reliable employment. Over 6500 adults in Northwest Ottawa County (equivalent to over half of the population in the City of Grand Haven) read at a third grade level or below. R.E.A.D. currently supports 32 tutor and student pairs but there are so many more adults we want to help.





Imagine If You Could Not Read

Debora (not her real name), is 66 years old, lives in Northwest Ottawa County, is retired after a 35 year career in the paper industry, lives in a lovely home and as a single parent provides her four children with a comfortable middle class life. She is illiterate. In November of 2012 Debora began working with R.E.A.D. tutor, Jean Grossnickle. She read at a 2nd grade level, one year later she reads at a 5th grade level.

Growing up were there others in your family who could not read?

No, I was the only one out of 6 siblings who had a problem. Most of my brothers and sisters went on to college.

What was school like for you?

Terrible, I was labeled a "slow reader", no testing was done, and no name

was given to my problem. I was embarrassed, still am. I struggled through school and dropped out in the 9th grade. What saved me was a good job and wanting to provide my children with a good life. I was promoted and learned how to handle responsibilities without people knowing I could not read. I did not dwell on things, there was no time and my children's needs were more important than mine.

How did you manage with out being able to read?

I knew the basics and had common sense. If my children needed help I sent them to their father who was educated. I relied on my parents, they were good parents, my siblings knew my secret and when I ran into something I could not understand they would always help me. As

my children got older I relied on them. The older children helped the younger ones. I made sure they all asked their teacher for help if they did not understand something.

What made you ask for help?

After I retired I knew it was time for me to focus on myself. I decided to get my GED and the instructor put me in touch with R.E.A.D. My tutor, Jean Grossnickle, is the first person that has helped me and I am so happy. That was just about one year ago and I love it

What happens next?

I am not going to quit. I am going to help others, and when I am sure I will not embarrass myself or Jean, I will tell my story and not remain anonymous.

Smiles Are The Same In All Languages

Lila and Shanti Bhattarai smile often, are quick to say thank you and are grateful that everyone has been so nice to them since arriving in Grand Haven fifteen months ago. Only able to speak a few words of English, they work with their tutor, Rhonda Johnson, on pronunciations and definitions, money exchange, penmanship and most importantly building a friendship. This experience has changed Rhonda's life. "They are beautiful, wonderful and hard working people. If I am having a bad day or a challenge, I think of them, they are my inspiration and I love them."

Both Lila, 51, and Shanti, 61, were natives of Bhutan; they owned and worked a family farm while raising their three children. In the late

1980's, in what has often been described as an "ethnic cleansing", with only days notice an estimated 80,000 Bhutanese of Nepali ancestry were pushed across the Bhutanese border and ultimately forced to settle in refugee camps in Nepal. They were not welcomed or issued work permits. They lived in temporary structures without electricity, heat or water. By 2007. due to natural population growth, the camps were overpopulated; approximately 108,000 refugees lived in the seven camps. In that vear an agreement was brokered to settle them in several Western Countries. Through Bethany Christian Services and area churches that sponsored them, many of the Nepalese refugee families were welcomed to the Tri-Cities.

Shanti and Lila's daughter, Talusha, was the first family member to arrive. Her two brothers, younger sister and parents followed. All are determined to master the English language and become U.S. citizens. That is their goal.

Rhonda has no doubt Lila and Shanti will meet their goal, "They work so hard and are always enthusiastic. I am so amazed at what they accomplish every time we meet. I cannot say it enough, Lila and Shanti are extraordinary people, working with them has been the most fulfilling experience I have ever had."
