- Achieve education beyond High School

In addition to free one-on-one tutoring, we offered a free monthly English Conversation Workshop for our English as a Second Language (ESL) students. Through this workshop, our ESL students practice listening and speaking in English in an informal setting.

"Every resettled person says that language is his or her biggest challenge in the resettlement process. R.E.A.D. tutors have been crucial in helping their students with those challenges."


